PREFACE

This is the third issue of the Victoria University of Wellington Law Review published to celebrate the Victoria University Centenary. The first two issues published in 1999 comprised work of the current Law Faculty, and work of past Faculty staff illustrating the development of legal education in New Zealand and Victoria University staff's particular contribution to public and international law.

This issue brings together many of the papers delivered at lectures and symposia held at the Law Faculty to commemorate the University Centenary in 1999. It includes papers from Capital Law School Day, a seminar organised by the New Zealand Institute of Advanced Legal Studies; Law Festival Week; the Australasian Law Teachers' Association Conference which was hosted by the Law Faculty; and the New Zealand Institute for Dispute Resolution Colloquium.

Many of the articles, written by past Law Faculty staff and students, reflect on legal education at Victoria and thus add considerably to the documented history of the Law School. Several articles illustrate the breadth and vitality of research currently being undertaken in the Faculty, while others reflect more generally on the law and suggest its future development.

Together with the Centennial Issues published in 1999, this issue provides significant evidence of the contribution made by Victoria's Law Faculty to legal education and the law in general. These issues provide a clear indication that the contribution the Law Faculty will make in this millennium will be equally strong.

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
